Love the Sinner, Hate the Sin

Dave talked to me about a conversation he had with another visitor to this General Conference. Dave wears a badge with a picture of his son when the son was about 8 years old, a badge that says, "My child is of sacred worth." The two of them began to talk about the badge and why Dave wears

it. Dave explained that he is longing for the time when his son, who is a gay man, can feel welcomed in the United Methodist Church. His conversation partner said, "But we don't say he isn't welcome. Of course he is welcome. We don't condemn your son. We just can't condone the practice of sinful behavior."

How often we hear it, *love the sinner, hate the sin*. If you imagine that sexual

orientation is a chosen behavior, it seems so easy. If, on the other hand, you are living inside a way of being, it is harder to separate. For instance, let's suppose that you, the reader, are a heterosexual person and married. When you consider what you should make for dinner and think about the foods your spouse likes and dislikes, are you "practicing" your marriage? Are you

Black Clergy Allies Support LGBT United Methodists

As the UMC Commemorates the End of Segregation, Panel Reflects on Racism and Heterosexism in the Church

On Sunday delegates to the United Methodist General Conference will commemorate the 40th anniversary of the end of official segregation in the church. Created in 1939, the Central Jurisdiction was a race-based, non-geographical unit that formalized the exclusion of African Americans from white Methodist congregations and the exclusion of African American leaders from the governance of the denomination. It was abolished in 1968—14 years after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that separate is inherently unequal.

In 2007, the supreme court of the United Methodist Church granted local pastors sole authority to deny church membership to lesbian and gay applicants, effectively authorizing a new form of segregation. Prior to that decision, existing church policies already excluded gays and lesbians from the full life of the church by forbidding the celebration of same-sex unions and barring gays and lesbians from sharing their gifts as ordained ministers.

On Sunday afternoon, shortly after the UMC's offi-

cial recognition of the end of Central Jurisdiction, four esteemed United Methodist clergy will share their reflections on the connection between racism and heterosexism in the church and add their voices to the calls for the United Methodist Church to include lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender United Methodists in marriage, membership, and ministry.

What: The Struggle Continues: Racism and Heterosexism in the Church.

When: 12:30-1:30 pm Sunday

Where: General Worth Square in downtown Fort Worth (9th and Main)

Who: Rev. Dr. James Lawson (retired), former President of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and one of the architects of the Civil Rights movement. Bishop Melvin Talbert (retired), former President of the National Council of Churches and former Director of Black Methodists for Church Renewal. Rev. Gil Caldwell (retired), Former chairperson of Black Methodists for Church Renewal and former Co-convenor of United Methodists of Color for A Fully Inclusive Church.

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“practicing” your heterosexual orientation? What if your spouse is terribly ill and you need to go to the hospital to speak for him or her. Are you “practicing” your heterosexuality when you stay by his or her side, when you hold his or her hand while you wait for a return to consciousness? As you age and talk through the questions of supportive care and inheritances and providing for each other when the eventuality of death comes your way, are you “practicing” your heterosexuality?

Well, that’s an odd way to look at it, you might say. I’m just doing what a married person does. That’s not about being heterosexual; that’s about being married. And, that is exactly the point. When gay or lesbian people enter into relationship, the things they do together are very similar—make dinner, care for one another in illness, provide for one another in death. It’s not about being homosexual, it’s about being in love, in relationship.

But, of course, there is more than that to love and relationship. If you are married, you and your

spouse almost certainly have portions of your relationship that are deeply private and precious to you. Pet names and special touches, a history of love, warmth, affection and passion, the part of your lives together that you don’t share with anyone else, because it is far too private and precious to cheapen with public scrutiny. I often speak of this feeling with the phrase, “Sex isn’t a spectator sport.”

Nor should it be. Not for heterosexuals, and not for anyone else.

Now, here is the challenge I would put to you. Have you ever in your

life looked at a person you don’t know and just known, without being told, that that person is gay or lesbian? And was it the case that you would have known it no matter how that person tried to hide their sexual orientation? If you have, then you confirm what we know, that being gay or lesbian is *who we are, not what we do*. That’s a given and is non-negotiable. It is fair to ask anyone to live a life that is wholesome, loving, and non-exploitative. It is not fair to insist that the joys and responsibilities of committed relationship are only God-blessed for heterosexuals. To love someone, to care for them and argue and share home

and bed, to play together and to take pleasure together in private, these are the blessings we mean when we say, as a church, *We recognize that sexuality is God’s good gift to all persons. We believe persons may be fully human only when that gift is acknowledged and affirmed by themselves, the church and society.* All means all.
